The Paradox:

→ Delayed Academics works because an older child can learn the same content in much less time than a younger child, and with much less stress and frustration. So waiting until they are older to teach the "subjects" is the smart way to go.



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→ But if you don't try to teach them anything, how would you know if they would have loved it, would have eaten it up, would have run with it, would have been a child prodigy in that subject?





- "I can repent and come closer to God."






- → Now it's time to challenge them! (challenge doesn't equal "force")
 Spread a feast of awesome in front of them.
- + If your child has already been playing with math (games, manipulatives) he will move quickly through arithmetic--he already understands it and just needs to learn the formality of how it's written. Seek understanding THEN memorization.
- + Learn to think logically--games, puzzles, Mind Benders, etc. Also, a bit of formal logic never hurt anyone.

What is needful at each age? (Academics)

Bigs

- Math for college prep: algebra, geometry, trigonometry, then statistics (not calculus). Non-college track kids should dabble in algebra and geometry, but focus on business classes and some accounting (then hopefully a bit of statistics).
- * Knowledge of theories of Government and Economics
- Specialty training or focus on passion (drama, art, dance, music, sports, robotics, programming, welding, etc.
- Learn and practice communicating (at least clearly, if not elegantly) in speech and in writing: rhetoric and debate clubs are great.
